THE GAME: The No. 1/1 University of Alabama football team returns to Bryant-Denny Stadium after a two-game roadtrip for a meeting with the No. 6/6 ranked Texas A&M Aggies. The matchup between the Crimson Tide and Aggies is scheduled for a 2:30 p.m. CT kickoff on CBS. Verne Lundquist and Gary Danielson will call the game from the booth with Allie LaForce on the sidelines. Eli Gold and Phil Savage will handle the radio call on the Crimson Tide Sports Network, with Chris Stewart serving as the sideline reporter. Nationally, the game will also air on the Compass Media radio network with Chris Carrino and Brian Baldinger on the call.

RANKINGS: Alabama remains No. 1 in both the Associated Press and Amway Coaches polls this week following Saturday's 49-10 win at Tennessee. Texas A&M is sixth in both polls after last week's bye.

TEXAS A&M: The Aggies enter Saturday's game with a 6-0 overall record, including a 4-0 mark in SEC play following an off week on Oct. 15. In their last outing, the Aggies defeated then-No. 9/9 Tennessee, 45-38 in overtime in College Station on Oct. 8. Texas A&M opened the season with non-conference wins over No. 16/24 UCLA (31-24 in overtime) and Prairie View A&M (67-0) before embarking on four weeks of SEC play. A&M defeated Auburn, 29-16, on Sept. 17, No. 16/18 Arkansas, 45-24, on Sept. 24 and South Carolina, 24-13, on Oct. 1 before the win over Tennessee. The Aggies are led by head coach Kevin Sumlin, who owns a 42-16 mark in his fifth season in College Station and a 77-33 career record between Houston and Texas A&M.

SERIES HISTORY: Alabama leads the series with Texas A&M by a 6-2 margin, dating back to the first meeting in the 1942 Cotton Bowl. The Aggies won the next contest in the 1968 Cotton Bowl, 20-16, to even the series. Alabama swept a pair of matchups in the 1980s, winning 23-10 in Birmingham in 1985 and 30-10 in College Station in 1988. In the first SEC meeting between the teams in 2012, Texas A&M defeated the Tide, 29-24, in Tuscaloosa. Alabama has since won the last three matchups, 49-42 in College Station in 2013 59-0 in Tuscaloosa in 2014, the largest win over a ranked opponent in Alabama history and 41-23 in College Station in 2015.

NEXT GAME: Alabama will be off on Oct. 29 before traveling to Baton Rouge to meet No. 25/23 LSU on Nov. 5. The Tide is 50-25-5 against the Tigers and 27-9-2 all-time in Baton Rouge. Alabama defeated LSU, 20-17 in overtime, in the Tide's last visit to Tiger Stadium in 2014. Nick Saban is 7-4 against LSU in his career, including a 7-3 record during his tenure at Alabama.

STREAKING: Alabama owns the longest winning streak in the Football Bowl Subdivision, having won 19 consecutive games dating back to last season (a loss on Sept. 19, 2015, vs. Ole Miss). The 19-game streak is tied for the fourth-longest in school history (28 games twice: 1991-93 & 1978-80) and matches the longest under the direction of head coach Nick Saban (19 games in 2009-10). During this stretch, the Crimson Tide have won eight games at Bryant-Denny Stadium, seven straight road matchups and four consecutive neutral-site contests while going 12-0 against teams from the Southeastern Conference. Alabama has outscored its opponents by 473 points (735-262; 38.7-13.8), an average of 24.9 points per game during the streak.

ALABAMA AS THE NATION'S NO. 1: The University of Alabama has played 66 games as the nation's top-ranked team since the inception of the Associated Press poll in 1936. In those games the Crimson Tide boasts a 56-10 (.848) record. Those numbers get even more impressive when you look at the 10 seasons under the direction of head coach Nick Saban (2007-present). Since the ninth game of the 2008 season (108 games), Alabama has played 42 games while being ranked No. 1, posting a 37-5 (.881) record during that span.

ALABAMA NO. 1 IN THE CLASSROOM AS WELL: Alabama has topped both the Associated Press and Amway Coaches' polls since the preseason but the Crimson Tide also leads all unbeaten Football Bowl Subdivision teams in another category - graduation rate. Alabama boasts the top Graduation Success Rate (GSR) among the 11 remaining undefeated teams in the FBS at 86 percent. Nebraska is second at 85 percent followed by Clemson and Boise State (both 84 percent) and Ohio State (81 percent).

FACING OFF WITH THE BEST: The Crimson Tide has the fourth-toughest schedule in college football this season per ESPN.com's preseason College Football Power Index, trailing only USC, Ole Miss and Florida State. Alabama will, by season's end, face off with nine teams who participated in a bowl game a season ago and will have met four teams ranked in the preseason Associated Press Top 25.

BEATING THE BEST: The Crimson Tide is 43-12 (.782) against the Associated Press top 25, including a 23-6 (.793) mark against AP top-10 teams since the start of 2008. This season, the Tide has faced four teams ranked in the AP poll, defeating then-No. 20 USC, 52-6, then-No. 19 Ole Miss, 48-43, then-No. 16 Arkansas, 49-30 and then-No. 9 Tennessee, 49-10. Alabama is scheduled for three more matchups against teams currently in the top 25 (No. 6 Texas A&M, No. 21 Auburn and No. 25 LSU). Alabama finished 8-1 in 2015 against the AP top 25 after going 5-2 in 2014, 3-2 in 2013 and 5-1 in 2012. The Tide held a 4-1 mark vs. top 25 teams in 2011 and went 5-3 in 2010.

SCORING SUCCESS: Alabama leads the SEC in scoring offense (45.4 points per game) and ranks third in scoring defense (15.0 ppg). Nationally, the Tide ranks sixth in scoring offense and eighth in scoring defense.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in only three regular season games that did not have national championship implications. Following the Crimson Tide's 24-21 loss to LSU in 2010, Alabama was essentially eliminated from a chance to remain in the national championship discussion. The final three games of that season mark the only three regular season contests without national championship implications during this span.

ESPN COLLEGE GAMEDAY: Alabama will be making its 37th (23-13 record) appearance on ESPN's College GameDay when the popular pregame show broadcasts from the Walk of Champions at Bryant-Denny Stadium Saturday prior to the SEC top-10 matchup between the Crimson Tide and Texas A&M Aggies. It will mark Alabama's 28th appearance under head coach Nick Saban (20-7). The 27 appearances since the 2007 season. It will be the ninth time College GameDay has visited Tuscaloosa since Coach Saban arrived in 2007. Alabama owns a 5-3 record in those games with wins over Penn State (2010), LSU (2013, 2015), Mississippi State (2014) and Auburn (2014). The Tide fell to Georgia in 2007, LSU in 2011 and Ole Miss in 2015. This Saturday against Texas A&M will be the 13th appearance by College GameDay on Alabama's campus, which is the second most in the ESPN program's history (Ohio State 14; Florida 12; Florida State 11).

THE FRIENDLY CONFINES OF BRYANT-DENNY STADIUM: Alabama has won 23 of the last 24 games at its home stadium. Prior to the Sept. 19, 2015, loss to Ole Miss, the Crimson Tide had not lost a game at home since falling to Texas A&M in 2012. Alabama boasts the sixth-best all-time home winning percentage in the FBS at .821 (248-53-3) at Bryant-Denny Stadium since the stadium opened in 1929. Baylor's McLane Stadium, which opened in 2014, is the leader with an .875 percentage (14-2) while Georgia Southern's Paulson Stadium, which opened in 1984 is second at .845 (185-34). Marshall's Joan C. Edwards Stadium (1991) is third with an .843 percentage (150-28), while Houston's TDECU Stadium (2014) is fourth at .842 (16-3) and Boise State's Albertsons Stadium (1970) is fifth with an .826 (251-53) mark, just ahead of Alabama.

FIRST TIME STARTERS: Running back Bo Scarbrough became the 13th Crimson Tide student-athlete to make his first career start when he took the field for the opening offensive snap at No. 9 Tennessee on Oct. 15. Freshman running back Josh Jacobs recorded his first career start vs. Kentucky on Oct. 1. Junior wide receiver Cam Sims was in the starting lineup for the first time against Kent State on Sept. 24. Jalen Hurts (QB), Gehrig Dieter (WR) and Anthony Averett (DB) made their starting debuts vs. Western Kentucky on Sept. 10. Ryan Anderson (LB), Dalvin Tomlinson (DE), Tim Williams (LB), Blake Barnett (QB), Miller Forristall (TE), Damien Harris (RB) and Jonah Williams (OT) started for the first time vs. USC in the 2016 season opener on Sept. 3.

NON-OFFENSIVE TDs IN THE SABAN ERA: Ronnie Harrison's 58-yard interception return along with Eddie Jackson's 79-yard punt return at Tennessee last weekend marked the 56th and 57th non-offensive touchdowns of the Nick Saban era and the 10th and 11th for the Crimson Tide this season, setting a new single-season record under Saban. Alabama has now scored at least one touchdown on defense or special teams in each game this season, including multiple non-offensive scores in all three SEC road contests this season (Ole Miss, Arkansas and Tennessee). Alabama has scored a non-offensive touchdown in nine consecutive games dating back to the CFP semifinal vs. Michigan State on Dec. 31, 2015, and has 12 non-offensive touchdowns in that span – four interceptions, four punt returns, three fumble recoveries and a kickoff return

TIDE LEADS THE NATION IN NON-OFFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS: Alabama's 11 non-offensive touchdowns in 2016 tops the Football Bowl Subdivision. Akron, Houston, Michigan and Ohio State have each tallied four non-offensive scores. The Tide has scored at least one non-offensive touchdown in each of its last nine games dating back to the CFP semifinal vs. Michigan State on Dec. 31, 2015, and has tallied 21 non-offensive TDs in its last 18 games dating back to the Georgia game on Oct. 3, 2015.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL

Alabama has been ranked in 750 of the 1,112 *Associated Press* college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 460-127-8 (.780) all-time record in games when ranked in the *Associated Press* college football poll, including a 102-15 (.872) mark under head coach Nick Saban. The Crimson Tide is also ranked in the AP poll for the 137th consecutive week, topping its previous streak set in the mid-1990s when UA was ranked for 71 straight weeks under head coach Gene Stallings. Alabama has started five seasons at No. 1 (2016, 2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. *USA TODAY* has administered the poll for the past 26 seasons (1991-2016), and in 2014, Amway became the title sponsor. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches' poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011, 2012 and 2015 seasons, while beginning at No. 1 in 2016. The Tide has compiled five UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 & 1979) and five *USA TODAY* (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012 & 2015) coaches poll national titles.

NON-OFFENSIVE WINS: Alabama's defense and special teams has outscored the Crimson Tide's opponent in four of seven games this season. In the season opener, Marlon Humphrey's 18-yard interception return accounted for seven of the Tide's 52 points, while the Trojans managed two field goals. Against Kent State, Xavian Marks' 75-yard punt return for a touchdown was the difference in Alabama's shutout victory. The defense once again proved to be enough against Kentucky with Ronnie Harrison's 55-yard fumble return going for seven points in a 34-6 win over the Wildcats. Defense and special teams provided two touchdowns in a 49-10 win over Tennessee on Oct. 15.

THREE NON-OFFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS EQUALS RECORD: Alabama's three non-offensive touchdowns at Ole Miss on Sept. 17 marked the third time in the last four seasons the Crimson Tide defense and special teams have found the end zone three times in the same game. The Tide took three interceptions back for scores against Texas A&M in 2015 and had punt, interception and kickoff returns against Virginia Tech in 2013. Prior to 2013, the last time the Crimson Tide had scored three non-offensive touchdowns in a game was Sept. 30, 1995, against Georgia.

ALABAMA HAS MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 105 games, the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Crimson Tide won 12 games in 2008, followed by a perfect 14-0 record in 2009, a 10-3 mark in 2010 and a 12-1 record in 2011. Alabama finished 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014 and 14-1 in 2015. Boise State is second with 96 wins while Oregon is third with 91 victories.

NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw seven former Alabama players selected in the 2016 NFL Draft, including first-round pick Ryan Kelly who went 18th overall to the Indianapolis Colts. Linebacker Reggie Ragland was the next to go (41st, Buffalo Bills) followed by Derrick Henry (45th, Tennessee Titans), A'Shawn Robinson (46th, Detroit Lions), Jarran Reed (49th, Seattle Seahawks) and Cyrus Jones (60th, New England Patriots), all in the second round. Running back Kenyan Drake rounded out the 2016 NFL Draft class when he was chosen by the Miami Dolphins at 73rd overall in the third round.

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: Alabama has had more draft picks over the last six drafts (44) than any other college in the nation. Fifteen of those picks have been first-round selections and 25 have gone in the first two rounds. The list of 44 features four Super Bowl Champions, seven Pro Bowl selections, one All-Pro and one Offensive Rookie of the Year.

OFF-THE-FIELD NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama's success on the field over the past nine seasons under the direction of head coach Nick Saban has coincided with the Crimson Tide's success in the classroom. *The 2016 squad features 10 players who already have degrees in hand going into the season opener with USC.* Over the previous eight seasons (2008-15) Alabama saw **94 degrees earned (graduate and undergraduate)** by players who were still suiting up for the Crimson Tide after having graduated. Since the 2010 season, Alabama has seen an impressive **11 players earn a master's degree** before stepping foot on the field. In 2015, the Crimson Tide led all bowl teams with a total of 29 players who earned their degrees prior to the start of postseason play. Three of the 29 earned their master's degrees during the 2015 season.

GRADUATING WITH THE BEST: The Alabama football team has not only been dominant on the field, but also in the classroom. The Crimson Tide ranks fourth among Associated Press Preseason Top 25 teams for its graduation rate of 86 percent. Ahead of Alabama are only Stanford (99 percent) and Notre Dame (93 percent) and UCLA (89 percent). Alabama's percentage was the Southeastern Conference's highest graduation success rate (GSR) of all 14 SEC football programs.

ACADEMIC PROWESS: The Tide has been a model of success on the football field, but the team has generated plenty of accolades in the classroom as well. Below are some of the academic highlights under head coach Nick Saban.

- A total of nine Crimson Tide players will take the field with their degrees in hand for the season opener with USC.
- Earned Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 86 this year, the highest across all 14 SEC football programs.
- In 2015, for the third consecutive year, Alabama football led the nation in graduates on its roster during postseason play (29 in 2015, 22 in 2014; 28 in 2013).
- Alabama's last four national title football teams (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015) included 89 players who had earned their degrees prior to game time.
- The 2014 team was recognized as one of the nation's top academic programs, ranking third in the annual academic rankings of the top 25 college football teams produced by New America, a Washington D.C. think-tank.
- The 2011 BCS national championship team had 21 graduates playing in the bowl game, which was the second most in the country.
- That 2011 team led the SEC with 38 student-athletes being named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll
- The 2009 BCS national championship team led the country with 11 graduates playing in the bowl game.
- In 2015-16, Alabama tied for the lead in the in number of football student-athletes being named to the SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll with 10 honorees. Alabama topped that list in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE COMMUNITY: Last season, Alabama worked 400-plus hours of community service in Tuscaloosa and the surrounding areas. The team volunteered their time across numerous areas last season including in schools, hospitals, with Habitat for Humanity and on campus.

HOWARD NOMINATED FOR WUERFFEL TROPHY: Alabama tight end O.J. Howard has been nominated for the 2016 Wuerffel Trophy. Howard completed his undergraduate degree in May 2016 and is pursuing a masters degree in sports business management. Howard, a 2016 Allstate/AFCA Good Works Team nominee, volunteers his time as a regular visitor to children's hospitals in Birmingham, with Habitat for Humanity and has been a regular visiting the VA hospital while with the Crimson Tide. Named after 1996 Heisman Trophy Winner, Danny Wuerffel, the trophy is presented in Fort Walton Beach, Fla., annually to the college football player that best combines exemplary community service with academic and athletic achievement. Former Alabama offensive lineman Barrett Jones is among the past recipients of the award. Jones was honored following the 2010 season.

ALABAMA ATHLETICS AS A WHOLE: The University of Alabama has built a total program, winning championships on the field and bringing home plenty of academic awards in the classroom.

- Since 2008, Crimson Tide athletics teams have won 10 national championships in five different sports and 22 SEC championships in seven different sports.
- Alabama claimed two SEC team titles during the 2015-16 academic year - football and women's golf.
- The overall cumulative grade-point average of Alabama student-athletes in 2015-16 was 3.16.
- Twelve Crimson Tide teams had cumulative GPAs above 3.0 for 2015-16
- Alabama student-athletes earned SEC Academic Honor Roll recognition 350 times during the 2015-16 academic year. The Crimson Tide had 82, 59 and 126 student-athletes named to the SEC Fall, Winter and Spring Academic Honor Rolls and 83 named to the First-Year Academic Honor Roll.
- Since 2000, UA has produced 113 Academic All-America honorees, which

DEFENSIVE NOTES

TIDE LEADS NATION IN DEFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS: Ronnie Harrison's 58-yard interception return at Tennessee on Oct. 15 gives Alabama an FBS-best eight defensive touchdowns this season. Ohio State, Houston and Wyoming have scored four times on defense this season while nine other teams have each tallied three times defensively.

The 63.9 yards per game average leads the FBS by more than 20 yards per game (2nd - Army, 84.2 ypg). The Crimson Tide has held its opponents to 2.0 yards per carry so far this season.

10 POINTS OR FEWER: Alabama's 49-10 win over then-No. 9/11 Tennessee on Oct. 15 marked the 62nd time the Crimson Tide has held an opponent to 10 points or fewer under head coach Nick Saban since the start of the 2007 season and the fifth time in 2016. In 2015, Alabama held six opponents to 10 points or less and recorded two shutouts. In 2014, Alabama shut out two opponents and held seven opponents to two touchdowns or less. Alabama held nine of 13 opponents to 10 points or less in 2013 with three shutouts. Seven opponents were limited to 10 points or less in 2012, four of which were shutouts. Alabama was successful in holding opponents to single digits in nine games in 2011 and eight times in 2010. Alabama kept opponents within that range seven times in both 2008 and 2009, and in 2007 posted two games in which it held opponents to 0-10 points. Alabama has shut out the opposition 17 times during the Saban era.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no defense has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama's defense has surrendered only 152 touchdowns over the last 101 games. That is 39 fewer than the second most in the nation (Florida with 190).

POINTS HARD TO FIND: Through seven games in 2016, the Alabama defense has surrendered only 105 points (15.0 ppg) to rank eighth nationally and third in the SEC in scoring defense. The Tide has held five of its seven opponents - USC (52-6), Western Kentucky (38-10), Kent State (48-0), Kentucky (34-6) and Tennessee (49-10) - to 10 points or less this season and has allowed only five red zone touchdowns in 15 trips inside the 20 by opponents.

NO GO IN THE RED ZONE: Alabama only ranks 47th nationally in red zone defense, having surrendered 12 scores in 15 opponent trips inside the 20-yard line. But a closer look at the numbers reveals how dominant the Crimson Tide defense has been once an opposing offense reaches the Tide 20. Of the 12 opponent scores in seven games, only five have been touchdowns, the third-fewest red zone touchdowns allowed this season. Michigan leads the country with three red zone touchdowns allowed in six games, followed by Ohio State with four in six games.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 200: During head coach Nick Saban's last 117 games at the Capstone (since the start of the 2008 season), the Crimson Tide defense has held the opposing offense to fewer than 200 yards of total offense 40 times, the most recent being Tennessee (163) on Oct. 15. The Tide has also held USC (194) and Kent State (166) and Kentucky (161) below the 200-yard mark this season. In 2015, Alabama held four opponents to fewer than 200 yards (Florida - 180, Charleston Southern - 134, LSU - 182 yards, ULM - 92). Alabama's best came in 2009 when the Tide held Chattanooga to 84 yards of total offense.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 300: In head coach Nick Saban's tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide has limited opponents to under 300 yards of total offense 81 times, or 62.3 percent of the time. Alabama opened the 2016 season by limiting USC to just 194 yards in the Tide's 52-6 victory and followed that up by holding Western Kentucky to 239 yards on Sept. 10. Alabama held Kent State to 166 yards on Sept. 24 and Kentucky to 161 the following week and most recently held Tennessee to 163 yards on Oct. 15. In 2015, the Crimson Tide held the opposition to less than 300 yards of offense 10 times (Michigan State, 239 yards; Florida, 180; Auburn, 260; LSU, 182; Arkansas, 220; Georgia, 299; ULM, 92; Middle Tennessee, 275; Wisconsin, 268).

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Alabama has allowed only three rushing touchdowns so far this season. In 2015, the Crimson Tide allowed just seven rushing touchdowns in 15 games, second-lowest total in the country. The Tide leads the nation in allowing the fewest rushing touchdowns since the start of the 2005 season, surrendering only 81. Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, the Crimson Tide has allowed 64 rushing touchdowns. Ohio State is No. 2 in that category, giving up 97 since 2007.

RUSHING DEFENSE: Alabama has surrendered only 16 individual 100-yard rushing performances dating back to the 2005 season, a mark that is the lowest in the nation. Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, the Tide has allowed 11 players to rush for more than 100 yards in a game: Georgia's Nick Chubb (146 on Oct. 3, 2015), Ohio State's Ezekiel Elliott (230 on Jan. 1, 2015), Auburn's Tre Mason (164 on Nov. 30, 2013), Virginia Tech's Trey Edmunds (132 on Aug. 31, 2013), Georgia's Todd Gurley (122 yards on Dec. 1, 2012), LSU's Jeremy Hill (107 on Nov. 3, 2012), Georgia Southern's Dominique Swope (153 on Nov. 19, 2011), Tennessee's Tauren Poole (117 on Oct. 23, 2010), Ole Miss' BenJarvus Green-Ellis (131 on Oct. 13, 2007), Houston's Anthony Alridge (100 on Oct. 6, 2007) and Darren McFadden of Arkansas (195 on Sept. 15, 2007).

OVERWHELMING DEFENSE VS. KENT STATE: The Crimson Tide posted its first shutout of the 2016 season in a 48-0 win over Kent State on Sept. 24, but the true domination is found with a closer look at the box score. Alabama's first-team defense limited the Golden Flashes to just 61 total yards on 27 plays before heading to the bench after the first drive of the second half. The more amazing part was the Tide surrendered a 47-yard run on the first play of the game and then allowed just 14 yards to KSU on the next 26 plays (0.54 yards per play), including just 13 yards passing.

BACK-TO-BACK GAMES WITH INTERCEPTIONS FOR TOUCHDOWNS: Ronnie Harrison's 58-yard interception return for a touchdown vs. Tennessee on Oct. 15 and Minkah Fitzpatrick's school record 100-interception return for a score vs. Arkansas on Oct. 8 marks the second time this season the Tide has returned interceptions for scores in consecutive games. On Sept. 10, Eddie Jackson found the end zone on a 55-yard return against Western Kentucky and Marlon Humphrey returned an interception 18 yards for a touchdown against USC on Sept. 3. Prior to 2016, the most-recent instance of back-to-back games with interceptions for touchdowns was in 2008 when Rashad Johnson returned interceptions for scores against Arkansas State and LSU on Nov. 1 and Nov. 8.

ALLEN MOVING UP CAREER SACK LIST: Jonathan Allen's first quarter sack vs. Tennessee on Oct. 15 gives him a team-leading five in 2016 and vaulted the senior from fifth into a tie for third on the Alabama career sack list with 23, equaling the total of Jarrett Johnson (1999-2002). Allen is now two shy of second place Kindal Moorehead (25, 1998-2002). The Crimson Tide's all-time leader for career sacks is Derrick Thomas (1985-88) with 52.0. Allen has recorded 11 sacks in his last 13 games. His two sacks against USC on Sept. 3 marked the sixth time in his career that the senior has registered a multi-sack game. Allen's career-high mark of three came against Mississippi State in 2015 as part of his team-leading total of 12.0 sacks by year's end.

FITZPATRICK'S RECORD RETURN AT ARKANSAS: Sophomore Minkah Fitzpatrick's 100-yard interception return for a touchdown vs. Arkansas on Oct. 8 is the longest in school history, breaking the previous record of 98 yards set by Mark McMillan vs. Chattanooga on Oct. 5, 1991. The score also gives Fitzpatrick three career interception returns for touchdowns, tying him for the Alabama career lead with Antonio Langham (1990-93), C.J. Mosley (2010-13) and current teammate Eddie Jackson (2013-present).

ANDERSON SETS CAREER HIGH IN TACKLES: Ryan Anderson's nine tackles vs. Arkansas on Oct. 8 are a new career high. His previous career high was six, set against Texas A&M in 2014. Anderson has 25 tackles this season along with a team-high 8.5 tackles for loss, 4.5 sacks (tied for second on the team), four quarterback hurries, one fumble recovery, two forced fumbles and a pass brekaup. His numbers this season continues his hot streak that ended the 2015 season. In the final six games of the 2015 campaign, Anderson recorded eight tackles for loss and six sacks. 10 of his career 15 sacks and 16.5 of his 29.5 career tackles for loss have come in his last 13 games played. In his time at Alabama, the redshirt senior has accumulated 29.5 tackles for a loss of 140 yards and added 15 sacks for -111 yards.

HAMILTON'S CAREER NIGHT VS. ARKANSAS: Linebacker Shaun Dion Hamilton established a new career high for tackles with nine stops against Arkansas on Oct. 8. The junior also added sack, 1.5 tackles for loss and forced a fumble in the 49-30 win over the Razorbacks. Hamilton ranks second on the team in tackles with 40 and has 7.5 tackles for loss of 32 yards and two sacks (-13 yards).

CAREER DAY IN OXFORD FOR FOSTER: At Ole Miss on Sept. 17, linebacker Reuben Foster posted a career-high 12 tackles against Ole Miss on Sept. 17. Foster's previous high was 11 against Tennessee in 2015. The senior leads the Tide in total tackles (41) and is third on the team in solo tackles (21) this season to go with four tackles for loss, one sack and three quarterback hurries. For his career, Foster has notched 148 tackles, 84 solo stops and 15 tackles for loss.

JACKSON EQUALS UA CAREER INTERCEPTION RETURNS FOR TOUCHDOWNS RECORD: Senior Eddie Jackson tied the Alabama career record for interception returns for touchdowns with his 55-yard return against Western Kentucky on Sept. 10. Jackson has three touchdowns on interceptions in his career, equaling the record held by Antonio Langham (1990-93), C.J. Mosley (2010-13) and Minkah Fitzpatrick (2015-present). Jackson had two returns for touchdowns in 2015 - a 50-yard score against Georgia on Oct. 3 and a 93-yard return against Texas A&M on Oct. 17. The return against the Aggies is the fourth-longest interception return for a touchdown in Alabama history.

FITZPATRICK TOP TACKLER IN THE SECONDARY: Minkah Fitzpatrick's six tackles vs. Tennessee on Oct. 15 increased his Alabama secondary-leading tackle total to 33. Fitzpatrick also leads the Tide in interceptions with three (including a school-record 100-yard return vs. Arkansas) and pass breakups with five. He has also forced one fumble and recorded two tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks. Fitzpatrick's six tackles vs. USC, Ole Miss and Tennessee are one off his career high of seven recorded against ULM in 2015. His two pass breakups against Arkansas equaled a career high that he has reached four times in his first two seasons.

FITZPATRICK GARNERS FOUR DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS AFTER ARKANSAS PERFORMANCE: Defensive back Minkah Fitzpatrick was named the SEC, Bednarik Award and Walter Camp FBS Defensive Player of the Week and Thorpe Award Player of the Week for his performance at Arkansas on Oct. 8. Fitzpatrick set a career high with three interceptions, returning one 100 yards for a touchdown, and recorded five tackles and two pass breakups in the Tide's 49-30 win. The selection is the second Walter Camp award for Fitzpatrick. He was also honored in 2015 following the Texas A&M game when he set a school record with two interception returns for touchdowns against the Aggies. His three interception returns for touchdowns ties him for the Alabama career record with Antonio Langham (1990-93), C.J. Mosley (2010-13) and current teammate Eddie Jackson (2013-Present).

ALLEN NAMED SEC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Senior defensive end Jonathan Allen was named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week following his performance against USC on Sept. 3. Allen led an Alabama defense that limited No. 20 USC to just 194 yards of offense and six points in the Crimson Tide's 52-6 win. The senior leader recorded a team-high two sacks for a loss of 15 yards along with four solo tackles and two pass breakups and was a disruptive force throughout the game.

VETERAN DEFENSE: The 2016 Alabama defense includes five starters from a season ago. Those five returned 245 total tackles, 32 tackles for loss and 16 sacks to this year's team. Of those returning starters, three come from the Tide secondary, including senior Eddie Jackson, who recorded 46 tackles, three tackles for loss and six interceptions entering the season. Jackson set a school record with 230 return yards on his interceptions and took two back for touchdowns a year ago. Senior linebacker Reuben Foster leads all returnees with 73 total tackles. Returning senior defensive lineman Jonathan Allen was the team leader in tackles for loss (14.5) and sacks (12.0) in 2015.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

HURTS SETS NEW CAREER HIGH IN RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS: Alabama freshman quarterback Jalen Hurts established a new career high in rushing touchdowns with his three scores vs. Tennessee on Oct. 15. The freshman found the end zone on runs of 45, 2 and 1 yards against the Volunteers. Hurts previous career high was two rushing touchdowns set in his Alabama debut vs. USC on Sept. 3 and equaled on Oct. 8 at Arkansas.

HURTS & SCARBROUGH ECLIPSE 100 ON THE GROUND AT TENNESSEE: Quarterback Jalen Hurts rushed for 132 yards and three touchdowns on 12 carries and running back Bo Scarbrough ran for 109 yards and a score on five carries in Alabama's win over Tennessee on Oct. 15, giving Alabama two 100-yard rushers in the same game for the 19th time in Crimson Tide history and the second time this season. Hurts (146 yards) and Damien Harris (144) also topped the century mark at Ole Miss on Sept. 17.

HURTS OVER 100 RUSHING AND PASSING AGAIN AT TENNESSEE: Jalen Hurts rushed (132) and passed (143) for more than 100 yards in a game for the second time this season at Tennessee on Oct. 15. Hurts also accomplished that feat at Ole Miss on Sept. 17 in his second college start (146 rushing/158 passing). Prior to this season, the last Tide signal caller to rush for more than 100 yards in a game was Tyler Watts in 2001 (110 vs. Ole Miss on October 13, 2001). Hurts is also the only quarterback to throw and rush for 100 yards in a game under Nick Saban in his 21 years as a college head coach.

DUAL THREAT: Jalen Hurts has added a new dimension to the Crimson Tide offensive attack in 2016 with the QB running game. The Channelview, Texas, native has rushed for 428 yards this year with eight rushing scores while throwing for 1,385 yards, nine touchdowns and just three interceptions. He has completed 63.5 percent of his passes and boasts a passing efficiency rating of 142.16, which ranks fourth in the SEC. Hurts is averaging 259 yards of total offense per game with 17 touchdowns responsible for and has thrown and rushed for 100 or more yards in a game twice this season (Tennessee, Oct. 15 & Ole Miss, Sept. 17).

FIRST-YEAR QUARTERBACKS: Alabama opened the 2016 season with a new starting quarterback for the fifth time under head coach Nick Saban and has played two first-year starters so far this season. Blake Barnett took the game's opening snap for the Crimson Tide against USC on Sept. 3 and Jalen Hurts has been under center for the first snap in every game since. Since 2009, Alabama's rookie signal callers have posted a record of 60-4 (.938) and won three national championships.

TIDE TOPS SEC IN SCORING: Through seven games in 2016, Alabama leads the SEC in scoring, averaging 45.4 points per game. The Tide has scored 42 touchdowns, converted eight field goals and 42-of-42 on PATs for 318 points. Alabama's 42 touchdowns also leads the conference - 10 more than second place Arkansas. Nationally, Alabama ranks sixth in the FBS in scoring.

FIRST HALF POINTS: ArDarius Stewart's 29-yard rushing score in the first quarter of last Saturday's game at Tennessee extended Alabama's first half scoring streak to 125 games, the longest streak in the nation. The last time Alabama failed to score in the first half was on Sept. 29, 2007, when the Tide and Florida State headed into halftime in a scoreless tie. The Seminoles won that game, 21-14. Alabama owns a 109-16 (.872) record during the current streak.

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: Alabama's school record consecutive games scoring streak was extended to 205 games with ArDarius Stewart's 29-yard run in the first quarter of last Saturday's game against Tennessee. Alabama was last held off the scoreboard in a 9-0 loss to Auburn on Nov. 18, 2000.

RUSHING TO SUCCESS: Alabama is 86-4 (.956) since the start of the 2008 season when rushing for at least 140 yards. The only losses were at Auburn in 2013, at Ole Miss and vs. Ohio State in 2014, and against Ole Miss in 2015. The Crimson Tide rushed for 140 yards or more 10 times in 2015 and has done so five times this season.

BALL PROTECTION: In its past 116 games dating back to a win over Tulane on Sept. 6, 2008, Alabama has turned the ball over only 137 times (77 fumbles, 60 interceptions) for 1.18 turnovers per game. Since 2009, the Tide has turned the ball over only 118 times in 101 games (1.17/game). Since 2009, UA starting quarterbacks have thrown an impressively low 47 interceptions in 2,696 attempts (1 INT every 57.4 attempts). Dating back to the 2009 season, the top two running backs in the rotation have lost a fumble only 21 times. Over that 116 game span, the top two running backs have recorded 2,970 touches, losing a fumble once every 141.4 touches.

HIGH-SCORING HALF: Alabama's 41-point outburst in the first half against Kent State on Sept. 24 was a season high for Alabama in the opening two quarters and the most since tallying 49 against Charleston Southern on Nov. 21, 2015. The Tide had tallied 17 points in the first half in each of the first three games of the season. The 21 first-quarter points equals the previous season high for a quarter, set in the third quarter of the season opener with USC.

ALABAMA DEEP AT WIDEOUT: The Alabama receiving corps boasts one of the deepest and most talented groups in the nation. The Crimson Tide have four receivers (WR/TE) with at least 1,000 career receiving yards and 75 career receptions. Sophomore Calvin Ridley has 128 career grabs for 1,522 yards (11.9 ypc) and 11 touchdowns. Tight end O.J. Howard has 83 catches for 1,340 yards (16.1 ypc) and five scores while redshirt junior ArDarius Stewart has 101 career catches for 1,228 yards and seven scores. Graduate transfer Gehrig Dieter has 1,669 career receiving yards and 12 touchdowns on 137 receptions combined between Bowling Green and Alabama. He has eight catches for 175 yards with the Crimson Tide and had 129 catches for 1,494 yards for the Falcons.

STEWART SETS NEW PERSONAL BEST FOR RECEIVING YARDS VS. ARKANSAS: ArDarius Stewart's 120 yards receiving vs. Arkansas on Oct. 8 is a new single-game best for the redshirt junior. His previous best was 113 yards vs. USC on Sept. 3 this season. Stewart established personal bests for touchdown catches (2) and longest reception (71 yards) against the Trojans. He is second on the team in receiving yards this season with 325 yards on 18 receptions (18.1 ypr) and three touchdowns.

CAREER NIGHT FOR JACOBS AGAINST UK: Freshman running back Josh Jacobs established new career highs in rushing attempts and yards with 16 carries and 100 yards rushing vs. Kentucky on Oct. 1. The yardage total also gave him his first 100-yard game at Alabama. Jacobs added three catches for 44 yards against the Wildcats to finish with 144 yards of total offense on 19 touches.

RIDLEY'S CAREER NIGHT VS. KENTUCKY: Calvin Ridley's 11 receptions and 174 yards vs. Kentucky on Oct. 1 established new career bests for the sophomore receiver. Ridley reached his previous high of nine catches twice, most recently against Western Kentucky on Sept. 10. Ridley's previous career high in yards was 140 vs. Arkansas last season. His two touchdowns against the Wildcats equaled his career best set against Michigan State in last season's CFP semifinal at the Goodyear Cotton Bowl.

SIMS' CAREER DAY VS. KENT STATE: Cam Sims' four catches and 54 yards against Kent State on Sept. 24 led all Tide receivers in the game and surpassed his previous career highs of three receptions (twice, last vs. Western Carolina in 2014) and 33 yards (vs. Western Carolina, 2014). Sims has five receptions for 66 yards in his three appearances this season, pushing his career totals to 18 catches for 174 yards, an average of 9.7 yards per reception.

HURTS OVER 100 RUSHING AND PASSING IN OXFORD: Alabama freshman quarterback Jalen Hurts became the first Tide signal caller to rush for more than 100 yards since Tyler Watts in 2001 (110 vs. Ole Miss on October 13, 2001) in a win at Ole Miss on Sept. 17. Hurts accounted for 146 yards on the ground and threw for 158 more to accumulate 304 yards of total offense on the day. His rushing total ranks fifth in Alabama history for rushing yards by a quarterback.

HARRIS & HURTS BOTH ECLIPSE 100 ON THE GROUND AT OLE MISS: Running back Damien Harris rushed for a career-best 144 yards and a touchdown on 16 carries and quarterback Jalen Hurts ran for a team-high 146 yards on 18 carries in the win over Ole Miss on Sept. 17, giving Alabama two 100-yard rushers in the same game for the 18th time in Crimson Tide history. It also marked the first time a quarterback has figured into that achievement since Jeff Rutledge and running back Johnny Davis did so against Auburn in 1977.

BIG DAY FOR HARRIS VS. OLE MISS: Running back Damien Harris had a career day at Ole Miss on Sept. 17. The sophomore ran for 144 yards on 19 carries, a 9.0 average, and had a 67-yard run that set up Alabama's go-ahead touchdown. He improved as the game wore on. Harris went into halftime with six rushes for 29 yards and broke out in the second half with 10 rushes for 115 yards and a touchdown. Harris' numbers are even more impressive as the game goes along. He has averaged 10.6 yards per carry (24 rushes for 255 yards) in the third and fourth quarters this season.

HURTS FIRST TRUE FRESHMAN TO START AT QB IN 32 YEARS: With his start against Western Kentucky on Sept. 10, Alabama's Jalen Hurts became the first true freshman to start at quarterback for Alabama since Vince Sutton in 1984. Sutton's first start was against Southwestern Louisiana on Sept. 22 that season. He would go on to also start against Vanderbilt, Georgia, Penn State and Tennessee.

HURTS SETS PASS YARDS RECORD FOR STARTING DEBUT & FRESHMAN: In his first career start at quarterback for the Crimson Tide, true freshman Jalen Hurts completed 23-of-36 attempts for two touchdowns while passing for 287 yards without an interception against Western Kentucky on Sept. 10. In addition to breaking the previous record for passing yards in a starting debut of 285 yards set by Brodie Croyle versus Arkansas on September 28, 2002, Hurts' performance also surpassed the previous Crimson Tide freshman passing yards mark of 167 yards set by Vince Sutton against Tennessee on October 20, 1984. Hurts connected on three passes of 40 yards or longer in the performance.

HURTS SHOWS VERSATILITY IN FIRST GAME: In his first game as a collegiate quarterback on Sept. 3 vs. USC, true freshman Jalen Hurts had a versatile performance that opened up the Crimson Tide offense after a sluggish start. Hurts entered the game on the Tide's third offensive possession and lost a fumble on his first play, but he quickly settled into the role and ignited the Tide offense through the air and on the ground. Hurts ended the night against the Trojans accounting for four touchdowns (two rushing, two passing), the first time a Tide player has had two TDs both passing and rushing since Tyler Watts in 2001. Hurts passed for 118 yards and two touchdowns with one interception while completing 6-of-11 pass attempts. He rushed for 32 yards and two touchdowns on nine carries. Hurts' longest pass completion was a 71-yard touchdown strike to ArDarius Stewart in the second quarter.

HURTS NAMED SEC FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK: Alabama quarterback Jalen Hurts was named the SEC Freshman of the Week for his performance at Arkansas on Oct. 8. Hurts completed 13-of-17 passes for 253 yards and two touchdowns and rushed for 20 yards and two touchdowns on eight carries against the Razorbacks. The rushing, passing and touchdowns responsible for (4) equal his career highs set in his first college appearance against USC on Sept. 3.

JACOBS EARNS SEC FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK HONORS: Alabama freshman running back Josh Jacobs was named SEC Freshman of the Week following his performance vs. Kentucky on Oct. 1. Jacobs made his first career start against the Wildcats and posted career highs in carries (16) and rushing yards (100) to help lead the Tide to a 34-6 Homecoming victory. He is Alabama's second-leading rusher this season with 307 yards on 37 carries (51.2 ypg) and has scored three touchdowns.

HURTS NAMED SEC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Alabama quarterback Jalen Hurts was named the SEC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance against Ole Miss on Sept. 17. Starting in his first SEC road game, the freshman signal-caller became the first Tide quarterback to rush for more than 100 yards since Tyler Watts in 2001 in the win over the Rebels. Hurts accounted for 146 yards on the ground and threw for 158 more to accumulate 304 yards of total offense on the day. Hurts' rushing total ranks fifth in Alabama history for rushing yards by a quarterback.

WILLIAMS EARNS SEC FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK NOD: Alabama freshman offensive lineman Jonah Williams was named SEC Freshman of the Week following his performance against USC on Sept. 3. Williams made his collegiate debut as Alabama's starting right tackle and was a vital component on a unit that rolled up 465 yards in total offense and averaged 5.4 yards per attempt on the ground. The Tide offensive line played a big part in career nights from running back Damien Harris and receiver ArDarius Stewart as Alabama topped the 50-point mark in a season opener for the first time since 2007.

RIDLEY LED ALL SEC FRESHMAN RECEIVERS: In 2015, Calvin Ridley broke the school and SEC single-season freshman record for receptions with 89. He finished with the second-highest catch total by a true freshman receiver in FBS history behind Antonio Brown's mark of 102 at Central Michigan in 2007. Ridley also set the Alabama single-season freshman receiving record for yards with 1,045, eclipsing the previous mark of 1,000 held by Amari Cooper (2012).

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

JACKSON LEADS THE NATION IN PUNT RETURNS: In his first season as Alabama's primary punt returner, senior Eddie Jackson leads the FBS in yards per return with an average of 25.8 yards per return (nine returns for 232 yards). The last 16 times the dual-threat returner/defensive back has touched the ball, the senior has accounted for five touchdowns (31 percent) on seven interceptions (three pick-sixes) and nine punt returns, two of which he has returned for touchdowns. In his career, he has touched the ball 20 times, accounting for 586 yards, averaging 29.3 yards per touch with five scores. In addition to his punt return numbers, Jackson has nine career interception returns for 303 return yards and four fumble returns for 51 yards.

SCOTT AMONG THE NATION'S BEST PUNTERS: Junior punter JK Scott is again a candidate for the Ray Guy Award, presented annually to the nation's top punter. Through seven games, he is averaging 47.0 yards per punt on 26 attempts to rank sixth nationally. Scott has forced nine fair catches, dropped 10 punts inside the 20 and 13 of his kicks have traveled more than 50 yards, including season-long 63-yarders at Ole Miss on Sept. 17 and Arkansas on Oct. 8. Scott proved to be nothing short of amazing as a freshman in 2014, averaging 48.0 yards per punt to lead the nation. He also helped Alabama lead the nation in net punting at 44.67 yards per punt. Scott placed 26 of his 55 punts (56.4 percent) inside the 20, which was the best percentage nationally. He has placed 64 punts inside the 20 and booted 57 punts of 50 yards or more in 35 career games.

GRIFFITH SEVENTH ON ALL-TIME SCORING LIST: With seven extra points vs. Tennessee on Oct. 15, senior placekicker Adam Griffith now has 64 points in 2016 (eight field goals and 40 PAT) to give him 292 career points (44 FG, 160 PAT). Griffith ranks seventh on the Tide's career scoring list, eight points shy of Shaun Alexander (300 points on 50 TDs, 1996-99) Griffith also ranks sixth on Alabama's all-time kick-scoring list. Jeremy Shelley is in the No. 5 spot on the list with 304 kicking points (44 FG, 172 PAT) from 2009-12.

GRIFFITH AMONG CAREER PAT & FIELD GOAL LEADERS: With his seven PATs against Tennessee on Oct. 15, placekicker Adam Griffith has now converted 160 of 161 attempts and remains No. 2 on the Alabama career PAT list behind Jeremy Shelley (2009-12), who converted a school-record 172 PATs on 175 attempts. Griffith's two field goals against Kentucky on Oct. 1 gives him 44 for his career (on 66 attempts) and moved him into a tie for fifth place with Shelley (44-of-55) on Alabama's career list.

CONSECUTIVE GAMES WITH PUNT RETURN TDs: Xavian Marks' 75-yard third quarter punt return for a touchdown against Kent State on Sept. 24 and Eddie Jackson's 85-yard punt return for a score against Ole Miss on Sept. 17 gave the Tide punt returns in consecutive games for only the second time since 1944. The only other occurrence was Nov. 14 and 21, 2015, when Cyrus Jones returned punts 69 yards and 43 yards for scores at Mississippi State and at home against Charleston Southern, respectively. Based on records available at this time (dating back to 1944), these are believed to be the only two occurrences in Alabama football history.

JACKSON FINDING THE END ZONE: Eddie Jackson's 85-yard punt return for a touchdown at Ole Miss on Sept. 17 and 75-yard return vs. Tennessee on Oct. 15 are the first for Alabama since Cyrus Jones went 57 yards for a score against Michigan State in the 2015 CFP Semifinal at the Goodyear Cotton Bowl. Jackson's return at Ole Miss ties for the eighth-longest in school history. The two punt returns for touchdowns this season ties him for fourth on the single-season list in that category.

SCOTT EARNS SEC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS: Junior punter JK Scott was named the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance at Arkansas on Oct. 8. Scott averaged 51.5 yards per punt on four attempts with two touchbacks and two kicks inside the 20-yard line. He also equaled his season-long punt with a 63-yard boot on his first punt of the game. Scott also had a 63-yard effort at Ole Miss on Sept. 17.

JACKSON NAMED SEC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Senior Eddie Jackson was named the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance at Ole Miss on Sept. 17. The senior defensive back took the field as the Tide's punt returner against Ole Miss and returned two Rebel punts for a total of 95 yards. Jackson's 85 yard effort for a touchdown late in the second quarter sparked an Alabama's rally that led to the Tide's 48-43 win. The performance in Oxford marked the first time in Jackson's career that he has returned punts for Alabama.

SERIES NOTES

THE ALABAMA-TEXAS A&M SERIES: Alabama leads the series with Texas A&M by a 6-2 margin, dating back to the first meeting in the 1942 Cotton Bowl, a 29-21 Alabama win that secured a piece of the 1941 national championship. The Aggies defeated the Tide in the 1968 Cotton Bowl, 20-16, to even the series. Alabama then swept a home-and-home series, winning 23-10 in Birmingham in 1985 and 30-10 in College Station in 1988. In 2012, Texas A&M came out blazing and used an early lead to win the game, 29-24. Alabama returned the favor a year later in College Station, winning 49-42. In 2014, the Crimson Tide pitched a 59-0 shutout in Tuscaloosa, the largest win over a ranked opponent in Alabama history. Most recently, the Tide returned three interceptions for touchdowns on the way to a 41-23 win over the Aggies in College Station in 2015.

SABAN VS. TEXAS A&M: Alabama head coach Nick Saban has faced off with Texas A&M just four times, all of the matchups coming while at Alabama. He owns a 3-1 record overall and has won the last three meetings after falling in his initial contest against the Aggies during the 2012 season. Saban and the Tide won the last meeting in Tuscaloosa, 59-0, during the 2014 season.

ALABAMA-TEXAS A&M CONNECTIONS: The Alabama football team has many connections back to Texas A&M. Most of those relationships were formed via former Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's coaching stints at both schools. Two of Bryant's protégés have served as head coach at A&M: Gene Stallings and Jackie Sherrill. Bryant and Stallings are the most notable connection between the two programs. Stallings played for Bryant at A&M before serving as an assistant coach at Alabama from 1958-64. He returned to Tuscaloosa as head coach from 1990-96, and has remained active with both institutions since his retirement from coaching. Sherrill played for Bryant at Alabama

from 1963-65 and served as head coach at A&M from 1982-88. Both Stallings and Sherrill coached against the Crimson Tide as A&M head coach, with Stallings and the Aggies winning the 1968 Cotton Bowl against Bryant and Sherrill leading the Aggies against Alabama in 1985 and 1988. There are numerous other connections as well: John David Crow was the 1957 Heisman Trophy winner and an assistant coach at Alabama from 1969-71 ... Curly Hallman, a native of Northport, Ala., played at A&M for head coach Gene Stallings and starred as defensive back from 1966-68 before returning to Alabama as an assistant from 1973-76 and 1996-97 ... Bobby Drake Keith played for Bryant at A&M and was an assistant coach at Alabama in 1958-59 ... Elwood Kettler was a quarterback on Bryant's first A&M team in 1954 and was an assistant at Alabama in 1960 ... Bobby Marks played for Bryant at A&M and was later a part of his Alabama staff from 1972-82 ... Dee Powell played for Bryant at A&M and served 20 years as an assistant coach at Alabama in 1958 and 1964-82 ... Dennis Franchione was the head coach at both schools, coaching the Crimson Tide in 2001-02 before taking over as head coach at A&M from 2003-07 ... Doug Walker, Alabama's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Communications, is a 1988 A&M graduate and also worked in the Aggies' Sports Information Office early in his career ... Amy Bragg, who serves as the Crimson Tide Director of Performance Nutrition, came from Texas A&M prior to the 2010 season.

PAUL "BEAR" BRYANT AT TEXAS A&M: Before he became a national icon, legendary Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant earned a national reputation as an outstanding coach via a remarkable turnaround of the Texas A&M program as head coach from 1954-57, where he compiled a 25-14-2 overall record and won a Southwest Conference championship. Bryant took a struggling Aggie program from a 1-9 record in 1954 to a 7-2-1 mark in 1955 (the best single-season turnaround in A&M history), a 9-0-1 SWC championship season in 1956 and an 8-3 mark in 1957. A&M was ranked No. 1 in the nation for three weeks during the 1957 season – the last time that A&M has achieved that lofty status. Bryant accepted the Alabama job near the end of the 1957 season, returning to Tuscaloosa where he created an unparalleled standard of excellence while leading the Crimson Tide to six national titles and 13 SEC championships. The only Heisman Trophy winner that Bryant coached, John David Crow, played for him at A&M before serving as an assistant coach at Alabama. Crow later served as Athletics Director at A&M.

ALABAMA VS. A&M AT VARIOUS SITES: The Alabama-Texas A&M series has been played at four different sites and returns to Bryant-Denny Stadium for the third time. Since the initial meeting in the 1942 Cotton Bowl in Dallas, the Crimson Tide faced the Aggies in the 1968 Cotton Bowl and then played A&M in Birmingham in 1985, Tuscaloosa in 2012 and 2014 and College Station in 1988, 2013 and 2015.

GENERAL NOTES

SABAN'S HOME RECORD: Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 118-19 (.861) in home games during his college head coaching career. He owns the advantage at every stop he has made during his collegiate coaching career, including a 59-7 (.894) mark while at Alabama. Saban has won 30 of his last 32 contests at Bryant-Denny Stadium and has lost back-to-back matchups only once, with consecutive losses coming at the end of the 2007 season (LSU and ULM).

SABAN'S SEC HOME RECORD: Alabama head coach Nick Saban owns a 47-10 (.826) all-time record when playing in a Southeastern Conference game at home, going 16-4 (.800) during his time at LSU and owning a 31-6 (.838) record at Alabama. While with the Crimson Tide, Saban has posted four perfect home SEC slates and has not lost more than one home conference game in any season other than 2007 (two losses). All six of his losses at home have been by seven points or less with half of those by three or fewer. Under Saban, Alabama has outscored its SEC home opponents 1,197-539 (32.4-14.6 points per game) and has limited the opposition to 14 points or less on 22 occasions, including six shutout victories.

SABAN VS. SEC OPPONENTS: Crimson Tide head coach Nick Saban owns a 99-26 (.792) career record in 125 games against SEC opponents. While at Alabama, he has compiled a 69-13 (.841) record versus conference foes, and is outscoring opponents by a staggering 3,276-1,283, or 39.9-15.6 points per game. Of his 13 losses against SEC opponents while at Alabama, all but two (Florida, 2008 and South Carolina, 2010) have been by seven points or less. Saban's first matchup with an SEC team came in the 1995 Independence Bowl against LSU, where his Michigan State Spartans fell, 45-26, to the Tigers. He would later go on to coach LSU to 30-12 overall record against conference opponents.

SABAN VS. AP TOP 25: Alabama's 49-10 win at No. 9 Tennessee on Oct. 15 gives head coach Nick Saban 68 career wins vs. Associated Press Top 25 teams, good for third all-time. Former Penn State head coach Joe Paterno leads the list with 86, four victories ahead of Florida State's Bobby Bowden (82). Paul "Bear" Bryant is fourth at 66. Recently retired Duke, Florida and South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier is fifth at 64. Saban's winning percentage against AP ranked teams (.631) tops Bryant (.592), Bowden (.557), Spurrier (.529) and Paterno (.512).

SABAN MOVING UP SEC WINS LIST: Alabama head coach Nick Saban is quickly moving up the charts for victories in SEC regular season games against conference opponents with 98 following the win over Arkansas on Oct. 15. His 98 wins moves him into a tie for sixth with Auburn's Shug Jordan and Tennessee's Phil Fulmer on the league's list of conference wins. Each coach ahead of Saban on the list, except for recently retired South Carolina and Florida head coach Steve Spurrier, is in the College Football Hall of Fame. Paul "Bear" Bryant tops the list with 159 conference wins at Kentucky (1946-53) and Alabama (1958-82). Spurrier is second with 131 league wins followed by Johnny Vaught (Ole Miss, 106), and Vince Dooley (Georgia, 105). Saban ranks first in league history in SEC regular season winning percentage at .792 (99-26). He is second in league history in winning percentage in all games at .820 (155-34). Saban is eighth on the SEC career wins list at 155. Tennessee's Robert Neyland is seventh at 173.

100-6 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF: Under head coach Nick Saban, the Crimson Tide is 100-6 (.943) when leading at the half. Alabama led Tennessee, 21-7, at the half on Oct. 15, and has held the lead in 17 of its last 22 games dating back to the start of the 2015 season, including six of seven games this season. Alabama had converted 36 straight halftime leads into wins before falling at Auburn on Nov. 30, 2013. The Crimson Tide converted 28 consecutive halftime leads into victories before seeing that streak snapped in 2010 against LSU. In 2007, Alabama held a 20-17 halftime lead before losing to LSU, 41-34, in 2007 at Bryant-Denny Stadium. In 2010, the Tide led 10-3 at the half before the Tigers rallied for a 24-20 win in Death Valley. Alabama lost 28-27 to Auburn to close out the 2010 season, after leading 24-7 at the half. The Crimson Tide is 5-8 under Saban when trailing at halftime after coming away with a victory against Ole Miss on Sept. 17 after entering the locker room down 24-17 at the break. The five wins in the Saban era when trailing at the half: 34-24 over No. 7 Virginia Tech in 2009 (in Atlanta); a 24-15 over No. 9 LSU in 2009; 24-20 at Arkansas in 2010; 27-14 vs. Arkansas in 2015 and 48-43 at Ole Miss on Sept. 17. His Tide teams are 4-3 when tied at halftime, and Alabama's four wins under Saban when tied at halftime: at LSU in 2008, (27-21), at Auburn in 2009 (26-21), against Tennessee in 2011 (37-6) and against Tennessee in 2015 (19-14).

200 WINS: Alabama head coach Nick Saban recorded his 200th on-the-field collegiate victory against his alma mater Kent State on Sept. 24. It was his 109th on-the-field win during his 10 seasons in Tuscaloosa. He recorded his first nine collegiate wins at Toledo in 1990, then won 34 games in five seasons at Michigan State and 48 contests in five years at LSU. With the win over Tennessee on Oct. 15, his 112 wins at Alabama are just three shy of Frank Thomas for the second most in school history. Saban boasts a 112-18 (.862) record at Alabama and a 203-60-1 (.771) record as a collegiate football coach (198-60-1 with vacated victories). Saban's first five victories at Alabama were vacated due to NCAA sanctions.

SABAN AMONG 20-YEAR LEADERS: Alabama's 45-40 win over Clemson in the 2016 College Football Playoff Championship Game was head coach Nick Saban's 191st victory in his first 20 years as a college head coach. That total is the second-most in FBS history for a coach in the first 20 seasons of his career. Former Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne won 195 games in the opening two decades of his tenure in Lincoln. Long-time Penn State head coach Joe Paterno ranks third with 187. Saban's five national championships in his first 20 seasons tops both Osborne (none) and Paterno (1).

AGAINST NO. 1: Alabama's eight wins over the nation's No. 1 team is the most of any program in college football history. The Crimson Tide has squared off against the top-ranked team in the AP poll 12 times in its history, going 8-4. And once again, the record gets even better under the direction of head coach Nick Saban, under whom the Tide is 5-1 against the No. 1. This includes national championship game victories over LSU, Notre Dame and Clemson, an SEC Championship Game victory against Florida and a regular-season win over Mississippi State in 2014. UA's lone loss was a 9-6 overtime defeat to LSU in the 2011 regular season, a loss avenged later that season in the BCS Championship Game, 21-0.

LARGEST DEFICIT OVERCOME: Alabama erased a 21-point second-quarter deficit at Ole Miss on Sept. 17, tying the largest deficit overcome in the program's history (not just in a victory, but in any game). Trailing, 24-3, with less than three minutes remaining in the second quarter, the Tide launched a comeback that equaled a 21-point comeback against a previous Rebels squad in a memorable 62-27 Alabama win in 1989. The Tide used a punt return touchdown by Eddie Jackson, and fumble return touchdowns by Da'Ron Payne and Jonathan Allen to punctuate the victory.

ALABAMA OPENS SEASON WITH A BANG: Alabama's 46-point margin of victory over No. 20 USC was its largest against a top 20 team since it beat No. 14 Syracuse by 55 points (61-6) in the 1953 Orange Bowl. It is also the third largest margin of victory against any ranked team in program history with the largest coming in the 59-0 win over No. 21 Texas A&M in 2014.

RETURNING SUCCESS: The Crimson Tide returned 14 starters and 46 letterwinners from its 2015 squad that finished 14-1 as the SEC and national champions. The 2016 team returned five starters on a veteran defense including seniors Jonathan Allen, Eddie Jackson and Reuben Foster. The offense welcomed back key pass catchers in tight end O.J. Howard and receivers Calvin Ridley and ArDarius Stewart.

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: Alabama has compiled a 246-131-4 (.651) all-time record in 381 televised games (not including pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed circuit telecasts). The Crimson Tide was 14-1 in televised games in 2015.

100 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 117 GAMES: With the Tide's 49-10 win over Tennessee on Oct. 15, Alabama has played in 100 nationally televised games since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest since the start of the 2014 season. The Crimson Tide was featured on CBS seven times in 2015, including at Georgia, Texas A&M, Mississippi State and Auburn; home against Tennessee and LSU and against Florida in the SEC Championship Game. The ABC family of networks hosted the other eight contests during the 2015 season, including the season opener against Wisconsin and Clemson (ABC), against Middle Tennessee, Louisiana-Monroe and Charleston Southern (SEC Network) and on ESPN for the Ole Miss, Arkansas and Michigan State games. In 2014, Alabama was televised in eight games on the ABC family of networks including contests with West Virginia (ABC), FAU (SEC Network), Southern Miss (ESPN2), at Arkansas (ESPN), at Tennessee (ESPN2), Western Carolina (SEC Network), the most-viewed college football game ever on ESPN, the Iron Bowl against Auburn and the Sugar Bowl against Ohio State (ESPN). The Tide also played in six contests that were televised on CBS, including versus Florida, at Ole Miss, against Texas A&M, in the Bayou against LSU, versus top-ranked Mississippi State, and finally in the SEC Championship against the Missouri Tigers. Eleven of the Crimson Tide's 13 games in 2013 were televised nationally with the Virginia Tech, Arkansas, Mississippi State and Oklahoma games on ESPN, the Texas A&M, Tennessee, LSU and Auburn games on CBS, the Colorado State and Kentucky games on ESPN2. Alabama played 12 nationally televised games in 2012, with one game on ABC, six on CBS and five on ESPN. In 2011, Alabama played on CBS four times, while having one on ABC, two on ESPN and ESPN2, and one game on ESPNU. In 2010, Alabama had five games on CBS, three on ESPN, two on ESPN2, one on ABC and one on ESPNU. In 2009, the Tide played two games on ABC (including the BCS title game), and six on CBS, while ESPN televised two more Crimson Tide games. In 2008, Alabama had 10 of its 14 games televised nationally, including five on CBS, three on ESPN, one on ABC and one on FOX.

10-WIN SEASONS: With last season's 56-6 victory over Charleston Southern, Alabama reached the 10-win milestone for the eighth consecutive season. The eight straight years with 10 wins extends the school record. The previous total for most consecutive 10-win seasons was five, set by coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's teams from 1971-75. In 120 seasons, the Tide has won 10 or more games 35 times, one behind Oklahoma (36) for the most 10-win seasons in college football history. Alabama has produced ten 10-win seasons since 2002 (2002, 2005, 2008-2015). Bryant had a school-record 13 10-win seasons at Alabama, while Saban is second with eight.

ALABAMA-USC DRAWS HUGE RATINGS: The season opening matchup on ABC's Saturday Night Football between the Alabama Crimson Tide and USC Trojans was college football's highest-rated game of the day, achieving a 4.9 overnight rating nationally, which was up 14 percent from the same window last season when Alabama's season opener with Wisconsin averaged a 4.3 overnight rating and was also the highest-rated game of the day.

NEW HIRES: Nick Saban made three new additions to his 2016 staff during the offseason, hiring Derrick Ansley to coach the secondary, Karl Dunbar to lead the defensive line and bringing in Brent Key to coach the offensive guards and centers. Ansley rejoins the Crimson Tide staff after four seasons at Tennessee (2012) and Kentucky (2013-15). He previously served as a graduate assistant under Saban in 2010 and 2011. Dunbar is returning to college football after a decade in the National Football League with the Bills, Jets and Vikings from 2006-2015. Dunbar also worked as a defensive line coach with the Bears in 2004. He previously coached at the college level with LSU, Oklahoma and Nicholls (La.) State. Key joined the Alabama staff after 11 seasons at UCF, most recently serving as the Knights' offensive coordinator and running backs coach.

SABAN AND FIRST ROUND NFL DRAFT PICKS: Since the advent of the NFL Draft, Alabama head coach Nick Saban ranks third all-time among college coaches who have tutored first round draft picks. Saban has coached a total of 23 players who were chosen in the opening round of the draft, including 18 from Alabama.

CRIMSON TIDE PLAYERS ON NFL ROSTERS: The Alabama football program is well-represented in the NFL heading into the 2016-17 season with numerous former players dotting league rosters. The Tide has 43 former players (active or injured reserve) working on an active NFL roster this season, the second-most nationally behind only LSU (45). In the last eight NFL Drafts, Alabama has had 55 players selected, including 18 players in first round, 17 in the second and third rounds, five in the fourth, seven in the fifth, one in the sixth and seven in the seventh round.

- Saban has a 198-60-1 (.766) record as a college head coach to date (203-60-1, .771 on-field record). He has five national championships – four at Alabama – seven conference championships and 17 of his teams have played in postseason bowl games, including a trip to the BCS National Championship Game following the 2003, 2009, 2011 and 2012 seasons and the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in 2015.

- Saban is the only coach to win four BCS national championships and the only coach to win back-to-back BCS national championships. He has won five titles in his last 13 years coaching college football after capturing CFP National Championship following the 2015 season. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years, joining Frank Leahy (Notre Dame - 1946-47, 1949) and Tom Osborne (Nebraska - 1994-95, 1997). He is also just the second coach in the poll era to win five national championships (Paul "Bear" Bryant).

- In 2009, Saban produced Alabama's first national championship in 17 years by guiding the Crimson Tide to a 14-0 season with dominant wins over Florida in the SEC championship and Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game. He then followed that up with his second BCS championship in three years with a 21-0 shutout of LSU following the 2011 season at the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. He made it back-to-back BCS national championships in 2012 with a 42-14 win over Notre Dame in the Discover BCS National Championship Game. He then took down Clemson 45-40 to capture title No. 5 following the 2015 season in the CFP National Championship Game.

- In addition to the on-field success, the 2011 team was also recognized with the Disney Spirit Award, which was presented to snapper Carson Tinker, for the team's response to the community following the tornado that devastated Tuscaloosa on April 27, 2011. The Tide also had extensive success in the classroom that year with 38 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, a league record, and produced an Academic All-American in Barrett Jones.

- His most recent college head coaching stint, a five-season run at LSU, produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships, three SEC West Division championships, and a 3-2 record in bowl games including two Sugar Bowl victories and a Peach Bowl win. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban's guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America. Saban was named SEC Coach of the Year twice (by the Birmingham News in 2001 and by the Associated Press in 2003).

- Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans' defensive coordinator/secondary coach. After playing in just one bowl game in the previous four years, Michigan State made four postseason appearances in Saban's five years at the helm. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach.

- In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season. The Spartans' performance that year landed them a spot in the Citrus Bowl. The Spartans led the Big Ten in rushing defense (77.0 yards per game) and total defense (299.0 yards per game) while ranking fifth nationally in rushing defense and 11th in total defense. The Michigan State offense averaged 31.0 points per game.

- Saban's first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points), and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

- A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. He earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen. They have one granddaughter, Amélie, and a daughter-in-law, Kelsé.

- At Michigan State, Saban started the "Nick's Kids" Foundation, which the Sabans continue here in Tuscaloosa. Since their arrival at the University of Alabama, the Sabans have helped raise approximately \$5.5 million for "Nick's Kids" that has been distributed to more than 250 charities and organizations throughout the state of Alabama and the Southeast. The Sabans also built 16 homes, one for each of the Tide's national championships, with Project Team Up and Habitat for Humanity following the April 27, 2011, tornado that struck Tuscaloosa.

- In June of 2008, the Sabans announced a \$1 million gift to benefit Alabama's first-generation scholarship program. The gift has a special meaning to the Sabans as both Nick and Terry were both first-generation graduates.
